This report is a way for the young people in the Bellingen Shire to communicate the issues they are facing, and to put forward their own ideas to improve circumstances for young people in the Shire.

It also provides comparison information in relation to our first annual YOUth Speak Survey which took place in 2022.

A year of strong youth engagement

Our first YOUth Speak Survey 2022 provided insights that led to over \$50,000 in grant funding being invested into youth community development.

Some points to highlight include the Bellingen Shire YOUth Speak Forum which drew together over 150 young people, working on turning issues into opportunities, and 48 young people creating nine high level concepts of projects to pitch to the community to seek support to lead to fruition.

THE SURVEY

Overview

Aims

The second annual YOUth Speak Survey set out to reevaluate the values, dreams and areas of concern among young people from across the Bellingen Shire, providing data to compare to the previous year. The survey aimed to capture crucial sociodemographic data and the outlooks of youth on a diverse range of topics including perceived obstacles to education and employment, general wellbeing, community perceptions of youth, and attitudes toward the future.

Involvement

A total of 298 young people aged 12-24 engaged in the YOUth Speak Survey, representing 18% of the youth population in the Bellingen Shire.

Young people were extensively engaged through varied channels and networks during October 2023 to achieve such a high response rate.

Beneath the stats and expressions in the report lie young individuals, each with their own backgrounds, experiences, cultures and values. What is displayed here is a mere scratch of the surface of the lives of these young people.







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




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


How happy are you Living in the Bellingen Shire?

Young people were asked to nominate projects that they would like to see happen in the Bellingen Shire in the future. 210 individual responses were provided. The top responses fit into the following four categories:

> Events and transport (including greater access to public transport, music festivals, concerts, movie nights, library events and camps)

Infrastructure upgrades (including skate parks, bmx trails, full sized basketball courts and footpaths)

> Workshops and programs (including more youth-led projects, art and cooking workshops, racism education, survival skills, fishing adventures and environmental programs).

> > Business opportunities within the Shire (including sushi and boba tea shop, fishing shops, smoothie shops and fast food shops).

This year our YOUth Speak Survey captured an impressive

of the youth population of the Bellingen Shire.

The top three issues for young people has remained mostly unchanged compared to 2022, with mental health, alcohol and drugs, and bullying continuing to be identified as the main three concerns in

2023.

1 in 4 young people still don't know where to seek help or support. This is a crucial gap we need to continue to address. From follow up conversations, we understand that there are many factors at play including stigma, perceived confidentiality, and logistical barriers (including financial, transport and lack of services on the ground).

59% want to communicate and share youth issues and ideas through their place of education. This reiterates the importance of services, communities and schools having strong working relationships. The biggest barriers to achieving goals within the Bellingen Shire has shifted significantly, with transport overtaking mental health as the main barrier. This is likely due to the large increase of responses from young people living on the plateau in Dorrigo and surrounds.

The large majority of young people from the valley and the seaboard identified the Bellingen Youth Hub as a place to seek help/support, whereas young people from Dorrigo mostly identified key people in their school.

YOUTH SPEAK Project impact

of YOUth Speak Forum attendants said the facilitators/scribes were helpful in leading the conversation, and that they felt more connected to the community through this process.

Out of those who participated in the YOUth Speak Forum, 78 responded to both the 2022 and 2023 surveys.

> In 2022, 28% of these respondents believed they had a voice in shaping the future of the Bellingen Shire. In 2023, this percentage surged to 93.6%.

Similarly, in 2022, only 7.7% expressed interest in organizing a youth forum, whereas in 2023, this figure rose to 45%.

Among the 78 respondents who engaged in both surveys and attended the YOUth Speak Forum, 41 went on to initiate a youth-led project.

In the 2022 survey, 18% of these respondents felt that the community generally viewed young people positively. However, in 2023, this positive perception increased to 59%, with an additional 7% stating that the community "always" holds a positive image of young people.
